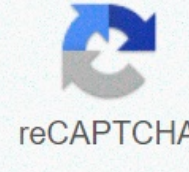

[5] [6] [7] The program consists of a team of agents who acquire items filled with energy that gives them dangerous force. After retrieval and neutralization, the objects are stored in Warehouse 13, the latest in an infinite capacity warehouse that has served this purpose for thousands of years. Plot The series follows U.S. Secret Service agents Myka Bering (Joanne Kelly) and Pete Latimer (Eddie McClintock) when they assigned to the mysterious Warehouse with 13 supernatural artifacts. At warehouse 11, the Regents began employing agents to collect and protect artifacts. [13] This practice continued under Warehouse 12, with British agents continuing to travel and continuing to search for artifacts to add to the collection. [14] [15] The next step was brought to the warehouse in South Dakota in the United States. Unlike the previous warehouses, which were housed in the headquarters of their empire, warehouse 13 was in a remote part of South Dakota to hide it. [16] The first warehouse 13 was built in 1898, but the structure burned down because there was not enough understanding to store the objects safely. [17] The move to the rebuilt and current Warehouse 13 occurred in 1914 at the beginning of World War I. The warehouse was designed by Thomas Edison, Nikola Tesla and M.C. Escher, while the warehouse's expansion joints were made by Albert Einstein. [18] Relics and gadgets are originally objects related to historical or mythological forms or events. Each find is pervaded by something from the creator, user, or a great event in history. Some well-known: Studio 54's Disco Ball, A reflection of Lewis Carroll, which contains an evil entity called Alice that owns other people's bodies (Myka in season 1's The Ester), leaving their minds stuck in the mirror; and Edgar Allan Poe's pen and a volume of his writing that can make what the user writes a reality. Some don't: Lizzie Borden had a mirrored compact that today forces users to kill their loved ones with an axe; Marilyn Monroe had a brush that now changes the user's hair into platinum blonde, which Myka once used on you while W.C. Fields had juggling balls that cause drunkenness and loss of consciousness. Others also have humorous effects, such as Ivan Pavlov's bell, which calls every dog to you, but causes excessive drooling for 24 hours, and a magic kettle that aids wishes but produces a ferret when the wish is impossible. The artifacts react with electricity and can be neutralized by immersion in a mysterious purple ragaca, or placed inside reflective bag, both manufactured by Global Dynamics, a research laboratory from Warehouse 13's sister show Eureka. Artie also mentioned that dallowing the neutralizer would see things. [19] Article 43 is replaced by the following: Cast and characters Main article: The list of warehouse agents consisting of Warehouse 13 is provided by the host country of the warehouse, in this case from various government agencies (e.g. Secret Service, FBI, ATF, CDC and DEA, etc.). The agents of Warehouse 13 were selected either because of their above-average intelligence (Artie is an expert NSA codebreaker, myka has eidetic memory and a wealth of encyclopedic knowledge, Claudia and H.G. Wells are both expert inventors), or because they have a kind of extranormal ability (Pete and Mrs. Frederic both get vibrations about situations; Leena can read people's auras; and Jinks is able to tell if a person is lying). Principal Saul Rubinek and Eddie McClintock Eddie McClintock, as Pete Latimer is a rule-bending Secret Service agent, now assigned to Warehouse 13. Ever since he was a kid, he's been able to record good and bad vibes. The series often refers to the way he is a recovering alcoholic who had been sober for more than eight years when the series began. He also loves cookies more than a little. Joanne Kelly as Myka Bering, once a rising star in the Secret Service, is a book agent. He has a conscientious eye for detail and an eidetic memory. He also has extensive knowledge of books after growing up in a bookstore. They often refer to a former partner who ended in tragedy, such as in the episode Regrets. Saul Rubinek as Artie Nielsen as special agent of Warehouse 13. A former NSA cryptographer and codebreaker, he spent more than 30 years in the Warehouse[20] and is very familiar with the artifacts, both in the Warehouse and in the world. He's going to be Claudia's surrogate father. Genelle Williams as Leena (season 1–4; Season 5), in nearby Unwille, where the team lives, owns the boarding house. He can read a man's aura. Simon Reynolds as Daniel Dickinson (season 1; guest season 2), Pete and Myka's former boss in Washington, D.C. Allison Scagliotti as Claudia Donovan (season 2–5; returning season 1) is described as a young, hip, brilliant techno-wiz[21] who is looking for a job at Warehouse 13 after discovering too much of his secrets. Warehouse 13 computer wizard Claudia Donovan (played by Allison Scagliotti) then traveled to the city of Eureka, Oregon, to check out the technological wonders of Global Dynamics in the Eureka episode Crossing Over. Fargo again appeared in the Warehouse 13 episode of Don't Hate the Player when Claudia, Latimer, and Bering traveled to Palo Alto, California to find Douglas beta testing virtual reality simulator using a dangerous relic. Betting The series premiere was Syfy's third biggest debut to date, garnering 3.5 million viewers. [24] [25] The first six episodes were among the top ten episodes of Syfy. Episode 6, Burnout, drew 4.4 million viewers, which was the record for Syfy's highest rated show. The second season began on July 6, 2010. It was renewed on October 5, 2010 for a third season of 13 episodes, which was renewed on August 11, 2011 for season four,[29] which on May 16, 2012. Syfy renewed the series for a six-part fifth and final season,[30] which was released on May 16, 2013. Warehouse 13's serial premiere was the most watched cable show on American television that night. [31] With 3.5 million viewers, it was Syfy's third best premiere behind Stargate Atlantis (2004) and Eureka (2006). [1] Joanne Ostrow of The Denver Post described the X-Files as easy, with bickering Scully and Mulder stand-ins taking part in Indiana Jones-style adventures. [32] IGN critic Ramsey Isler gave the pilot a positive review, but felt it wasn't enough to give Syfy a chance to brag about the best sci-fi show on TV again. [33] Ken Tucker of Entertainment Weekly gave him a negative review in July 2009, describing the Lost Ark as an unlyx cross between X-Files, bones and looters. [34] In July 2010, Tucker amended his opinion, stating that the warehouse had evolved as it progressed and became more and more riveting; then gave the show a B rating. [35] In 2010, the show's composer, Edward Rogers, was nominated for an Emmy for Best Original Theme Music. [36] Warehouse 13 received seven 2012 Portal Award nominations, including Best Television Series, Best Actor (Eddie McClintock), Best Actress (Joanne Kelly), Best Supporting Actor (Saul Rubinek), Best Supporting Actress (Allison Scagliotti), Best Special Guest (Jaime Murray as Helena G. Wells) and Best Episode (Emily Lake). It was Eddie McClintock's third straight and the second nomination for Saul Rubinek. Rubinek, Alison Scagliotti. In September 2020, Warehouse reached 13.82 percent among all critics (60 percent among top critics) and 87 percent among Rotten Tomatoes audience members.
